White River Jct. Italian History Night a big Success



Marion and 3 Ralphs: Terino, Guarino and Falzarano

Fifty-one people came to our September meeting. After enjoying a delightful pot luck dinner featuring Italian food, the guest panel of four (pictured above) discussed growing up in White River Junction. Marion Schettino Levesque was joined by Rafaele (Italian for Ralph) Terino, Ralph Guarino and Ralph Falzarano. All were children (or in Falzarano's case, a grandchild) of immigrants who came to this country from Italy late in the nineteenth century or early in the present century. Actually they all were cousins. For instance, Ralph Guarino's mother and Rafaele's mother were sisters. Society secretary David Ford took extensive notes which he is checking with the panel members and creating a genealogy of our speakers. It will become a part of the permanent record of this meeting. Although the many White River immigrants did not know one another before arriving in Vermont, they came from the area around Naples, Italy. Some of the men worked briefly in the Boston area but ultimately they all wound up in White River Jct., working on the railroad and living nearby on

South Main, South Elm, and Nutt Lane. (When the railroad expanded it bought all the houses on South Elm Street and moved them to Nutt Lane.)

Today many of their descendants are living in Wilder, fairly close to one another as had the earlier generations been in WRJ. Their number include members of many professions including lawyers, entrepreneurs and store-keepers. The panelist reminisced at great length about the White River Junction of their youth. The audience loved it. If you missed that evening do look for David's report. In the meantime, at right: a photograph of Marion Levesque who is proud of her more than 90 years.


Taylor's Pond

We painted it yellow with green spots on the body. In the middle of the night, we put it in the pond. Next morning Ed called. Tell Howard to get down here there's something awful in the pond. The head hung in Taylor's garage for years.

A Civil War Letter from the HHS Collection


The motif at the top of the letter at the right is in red, white and blue. Dated November 11, 1861, Camp Griffin, the letter is from Edgar Ordway of South Pomfret to "Friend Berkley." In it, Ordway notes that, "I enjoy soldier's life and am enjoying good health and like first rate." Later on he mentions that Sgt. Phillip V. Thomas has gone back to White River to get some recruits. He adds. "I think you and John had better come out here with him and (.....). into this Co." Edgar Ordway's address was: Co. F. 3rd Regt. Vt Volunteers, Washington, D. C. We do not know if Berkley and John joined up. However, upon checking Vail's History of Pomfret, we found hat Ordway enlisted September 17, 1861; was discharged for disability Nov. 30, 1862; re-enlisted Dec. 25. 1863; died June 14, 1864, from wounds received May 12, 1864. Archivist Pat Stark will have a copy of this letter at our November 11th meeting featuring Howard Coffin talking on the Civil War.




